The Grave Tales Tour: The Grave Tales Ghost Tour is Savannah's #1 Haunted History Tour. A perfect tour for families, this tour dives into Savannah's history and how it has helped make Savannah as haunted as it is. You'll visit some of the more famous Haunted Locations in Savannah, some of them featured on famous ghost hunting shows like Ghost Hunters and Ghost Adventures. (9:00 pm nightly)

Savannah Haunted Pub Crawl: If you're out with a group of friends and you're looking for something to do one evening in Savannah, the Haunted Pub Crawl is the perfect excuse to go out, have a great time, and have a few drinks along the way. This tour visits the most haunted and historic bars within Savannah's Historic District. (9:00 pm nightly)

The Dead of Night Tour: The Dead of Night Ghost Tour is Savannah's late-night Adults only Ghost Tour. Focusing on the darker hauntings which occur in Savannah, this tour will take you to some of the most evil locations in Savannah, where all of the ghosts are not so friendly. Expect to hear about the occult, demons, and much more! (11:00 pm nightly)

America's Most Haunted City Tour: The America's Most Haunted City Tour is our way of taking you through the oldest and most haunted parts of Savannah's Historic District and we cover the history of this haunted heritage and reputation by starting at the beginning. We delve into and visit the site of a witch execution, Savannah's oldest lost and extant cemeteries, haunted 19th-century hotels, all the way to a modern day hag attack. (7:00 pm and 9:00 pm nightly)

Bonaventure Cemetery Tours: One of the oldest sayings in Savannah is, "No visit to Savannah is complete without a visit to Bonaventure Cemetery," and with 800,000 people a year exploring 150+ acres of natural splendor mixed with statues, ironwork, and some of Savannah's most famous reposed lying in state, you'll soon understand why this should be at the very top of your Savannah-To-Do-Bucket-List! (10:00 am and 2:00 pm daily)

Sixth Sense Savannah Ghost Tour: Previous to 2002, no ghost storytelling occurred in this central Historic District neighborhood. That all changed when we unveiled and pioneered this area's haunted history through exploring it for 12 years, garnering stories from many friends and neighbors residing there to create the best haunted walking tour of Savannah. In fact, both Scariest Places On Earth (Linda Blair) & Ghost Hunters episodes were filmed in the neighborhood because of our investigations! (7:00 pm and 9:30 pm nightly)

We also encourage you to tour at your own pace. Our tour offers on and off privileges, which allows you to hop off the trolley and explore on your own at any time. With frequent pickups at all our stops, this helps you avoid walking long distances.

Travel past ancient cemeteries, (those still standing and those that have fallen victim to the passage of time and progress), antebellum mansions, and lush squares ripe with live oaks dripping with Spanish moss. Dolphin Magic Tours was originally founded by Captain Derek Brown in the Summer of 1999. The 41 foot twin turbo diesel has a maximum capacity of 48 people. The tour boat is located in Savannah, Georgia at the Heart of River Street on the starboard (right) side of the Hyatt Regency Hotel. We invite you to come aboard, sit back and relax and enjoy a two-hour narrated cruise along Savannah's historic waterways out towards Tybee Island. See such sights as Savannah's historic waterfront, the Waving Girl, Fort Jackson, Fort Pulaski, Cockspur Island, the Cockspur Island Lighthouse, Tybee Island and the Tybee Island Lighthouse. * (Route and trip duration may vary depending on dolphin location and weather conditions). Ask about our dolphin guarantee!

Savannah River Boat - <https://savannahriverboat.com/>

The riverboat tours leave the dock right next to the exact location where General Oglethorpe first landed on the river front and head upriver, into the Port of Savannah, and then turn around and head back under the Eugene Talmadge Memorial Bridge and past the historic river front. The tours continue downriver passing the world famous Waving Girl, Florence Martus, through the ship yards and just past the tip of Hutchinson Island and Old Fort Jackson. There, the boat circles back upriver to arrive gently back at the dock.

SHOPPING

Broughton Street

Hip boutiques, popular chain stores, galleries, unique gourmet shops and some of the city's best restaurants contribute to Broughton Street's reputation as one of the city's most popular shopping destinations. Two century-old, family-owned businesses anchor Broughton Street--Levy Jewelers, which features an impressive collection of diamonds, watches, jewelry and giftware, and Globe Shoe Company, one of the city's best stores for high-quality footwear and accessories. Broughton Street also boasts upscale retailers Marc Jacobs (the label's only company store in the South outside of Miami) and Kate Spade, along with Urban Outfitters, Gap and Banana Republic. But some of the best shopping can be found in Broughton Street's many locally owned businesses, among them jewelry store ZIA Boutique, skincare shop Sugar Works, handbag boutique Satchel, furniture store 24e Design Co., and the Savannah Bee Company, a retail shop specializing in Savannah-made honey.

City Market | W Saint Julian St, Savannah, GA 31401

City Market is a favorite among visitors and locals alike. An ode to the original City Market, which was used by farmers and traders in the 18th century to sell their goods, the open-air market has a little bit of something for everyone. City Market is home to several art galleries, including the A.T. Hun Gallery, Jim Pennington Fine Art, Raffine Galerie, Signature Gallery, Stephen Kasun Gallery and Thomas Kinkade Gallery, along with several smaller galleries and artists who have space in the market's Art Center. There are several gift shops that boast an array of Savannah souvenirs and other goodies, among them All Things Georgia, Trolley Stop Gifts and Cinnamon Bear. Specialty retailers include Twinkle, which features fun fashion accessories, perfumery Scents of Savannah, bookstore Savannah Prose and Poetry, and Savannah Cigars.

River Street

If you're looking to pick up some Savannah souvenirs during your visit, River Street is the place to shop. But Savannah T-shirts and magnets aren't the only reason to hit up the historic street that overlooks the Savannah River. There's something for collectors (True Grits, a shop that specializes in Civil War artifacts), peanut lovers (The Peanut Shop of Savannah, a store that sells more than 50 varieties of hand-roasted peanuts) and book lovers (Books on Bay, a bookstore that features thousands of books from the 1700s to the late 1900s). There are also lovely galleries, an open-air marketplace, a good selection of restaurants and bars, and not one, but two candy stores.

ShopSCAD | 340 Bull St, Savannah, GA 31401

ShopSCAD, a retail store operated by the college that features jewelry, decor, paintings, pottery, photography, apparel and other gift items designed by the college's students and alumni, is the perfect way to take a piece of the college home. Several items available at shopSCAD have been featured in prestigious magazines, including Vogue, Lucky and Woman's Day.

Tanger Outlets | 200 Tanger Outlets Blvd, Pooler, GA 31322

While Downtown Savannah is a magnificent place to shop, you can't forget that Savannah now has its own outlet stores just 15 minutes outside of our beautiful Historic District. Tanger Outlets opened in the spring of 2015 and has been attracting hundreds every week since. So if Broughton Street doesn't satisfy your desire for big brand names, then be sure to check out Tanger, where all kinds of great brand names and popular shops await with great sales.

Whitaker Street

If you're wondering where all of the local fashion boutiques hiding, it's in Savannah's Downtown Design District – on Whitaker Street just north of Forsyth Park! But it's not just clothing you'll find on Whitaker. Surrounded by gorgeous homes on a street that runs along Forsyth Park are many shops that locals adore, including Custard Boutique, La Paperie and One Fish Two Fish.

Wright Square | 21 West York Street, Savannah, GA 31401

Many people stop by Wright Square, the city's second-oldest square, to visit a monument that memorializes famed Native American leader Tomochichi. Bringing together diverse groups and celebrating unity is very much the mantra of the merchants whose businesses populate Wright Square and the adjacent streets. Galleries (Friedman's Fine Arts and Liquid Sands Glass Gallery), first-rate confectionaries (chocolatier Wright Square Café and the Cupcake Emporium) and antique stores (Antiquities Antique Store and Wright Square Antique Mall) work together, along with the other lovely stores in the area to create a first-rate shopping experience for visitors.

Andrew Low House: <http://www.andrewlowhouse.com/>

Andrew Low commissioned New York architect John Norris to design and construct his house in 1848. Norris came to Savannah to design the Custom House on Bay Street and remained in Savannah to build many desirable residences with the latest in technology and luxury. The Italianate exterior features intricate cast iron railings and side balconies contrasting with the smooth stuccoed brick walls. The well proportioned rooms are decorated with elaborate plaster cornices and carved woodwork. The delicate balance of exterior restraint and opulent interior resulted in an elegant villa for the family. The house remained in the family until the death of Andrew Low's daughter-in-law, Juliette Gordon Low, Founder of Girl Scouts of the USA. The National Society of The Colonial Dames of America in the State of Georgia purchased the house from her heirs in 1928. Following many years of loving maintenance and conservation the house was opened to the public in 1950.

Bonaventure Cemetery is over 170 years old, and features few modern amenities. We suggest comfortable shoes, sunscreen in the summer months, and bug spray most of the year to keep the "no see'ums" – sand gnats – at bay. We also strongly recommend bringing bottled water during the Spring, Summer and Fall months.

Cathedral of St. John the Baptist: <https://savannahcathedral.org/>

The church was dedicated on its current site on April 30, 1876. A fire in 1898 destroyed much of the structure. It was rebuilt quickly and re-opened in 1900. The Cathedral represents historically noteworthy architecture as well as over a century of faith and civic traditions in Savannah. The Cathedral is open to the community of Savannah as well as to hundreds of thousands of visitors every year. The Cathedral remains in the top 10 historic sites to visit in the United States. Visitors continue to rate the Cathedral as, "a must see," during their trips to Savannah.

The church is open for self-guided touring Monday-Saturday – 9:00 A.M. – 11:45 A.M and 12:45 P.M. – 5:00 P.M. Please check the Calendar for changes to this schedule. A small donation of \$3.00 per adult is appreciated. The Cathedral is an active house of worship. Guided and self-guided tours are not allowed during Masses or other religious events. The church is closed for touring during funerals and weddings. The church is closed for touring on most Holy Days, such as Good Friday. Please check our Calendar for closings.

Forsyth Park

Forsyth Park is the ultimate gathering spot for Savannah's locals and visitors alike. At the park you'll find tennis and basketball courts, grassy fields, an amphitheater, a Fragrant Garden for the blind and a quaint cafe. But when most people think of the park, the Forsyth Park fountain comes to mind.

The oldest continually operating theatre in the United States, The Historic Savannah Theatre was built in 1818, opening in December with a comedy. Now, the square where it sits, Chippewa Square has become a huge part of Savannah nightlife and entertainment, mostly because of the theatre. Now, while the theatre does offer nightly shows, it also offers something else for cinema geeks. Right outside, sits a bench where several scenes of the movie Forrest Gump was shot.

Old Fort Jackson is a must-see National Historic Landmark offering daily cannon firings and exciting interactive programs for adults, kids and families! Only minutes away from historic downtown Savannah, you can experience unique views of Savannah's riverfront and walk on the grounds of one of the oldest brick fortifications on the East Coast.

Jepson Center: The Jepson Center links the history preserved by the Owens-Thomas House & Slave Quarters and Telfair Academy to the future of art and architecture. The strikingly modern building, opened in 2006, is filled with art, activities, and educational opportunities that will encourage learning for generations to come.

Telfair Academy: The Telfair Academy is just short walk away from the Jepson Center, but that short distance covers nearly 200 years of history. The stately two-story mansion, designed by William Jay in the Neoclassical Regency style and built in 1819, is just three historic squares away from Jay's other masterpiece, the Owens-Thomas House. The Telfair Academy contains three nineteenth-century period rooms and houses nineteenth- and twentieth-century American and European art from the museum's permanent collection including paintings, works on paper, sculpture, and decorative arts.

Owens-Thomas House & Slave Quarters: Built as a beautiful Regency style mansion in 1819, the Owens-Thomas House, along with its adjacent gardens, carriage house, and slave quarters, allows visitors to explore the complicated relationships between the most and least powerful people in the city of Savannah in the early 19th century. Only a seven-minute walk from Telfair Museums' other two sites, this historic home offers a completely different experience. Visitors on our guided tours explore period rooms full of exquisite decorative arts, interactive exhibits for all ages, and historic spaces filled with stories, all while learning about the people, both free and enslaved, who lived and worked on the site 200 years ago.
